By installing this habitat structure, you are providing an essential nesting area for wildlife in need. Landowners like you play a vital role in providing habitat for wildlife in the Credit River watershed.

Habitat

American kestrels are found in open habitats where they can hunt and perch on tall trees including meadows, grasslands and forest edges.

When to Expect Them

March to mid-July

Call

Sounds like: “Killy-killy-killy” or “klee-klee-klee”

Habitat Structure Placement

Location	Open field, grassland, forest edge
Height off Ground (m)	3 – 9
Entrance Hole Facing	South or East
Spacing	1 km apart
Attach to	Live tree, pole, building
Installation Time	September to February

Care of the Habitat Structure

Clean out old nest material before the breeding season begins in March. To access the box, turn the latch near the bottom of the box and rotate the moveable panel upward. Add 5 to 10 cm of coarse wood shavings to the bottom of the box.

Important Notes

Be careful not to place the box within 1 km of established nest boxes or colonies of prey species such as barn swallows. Keep at least 1 km apart.

What Else Can You Do to Help?

Take action to provide natural nesting sites for kestrels on your property, reducing the need for nest boxes. Leave dead standing trees that do not pose a hazard to people. Refrain from mowing areas of your lawn or field until the end of the summer to provide food, shelter and breeding space.
